National Biodiversity Week

Celebrating National Biodiversity Week 2023 on Saturday 20th May the IPCC hosted a walk and talk exploring bogland birds to Lodge Bog where participants learned about the different birds that use the bog. Back at the Bog of Allen Nature Centre, some young peatland explorers went pond dipping, finding mini-beasts such as dragonfly nymphs, diving beetles and water boatmen. The insect-eating plants in the greenhouse were also

investigated, while a newt was spotted in the gardens. Later in the week, a butterfly walk to Lullymore West Nature Reserve was hosted on 23rd May. Participants learned about the IPCC's management of the site and observed the Marsh Fritillary, Ireland's only legally protected insect, as well as Brimstone, Dingy Skipper, Common Blue and Speckled Wood butterflies on the wing. It was great to also observe the Narrowbordered Bee Hawk-moth.

Large Heath Habitat Assesment



Throughout June and July surveys to monitor the population of the Large Heath butterfly on Lodge Bog are ongoing. Positive results are been recorded with the confirmation of the presence of the Large Heath butterfly on the reserve. This work is being co-ordinated by the IPCC's Conservation and Education Officers who's roles are supported by the Heritage Capacity Fund of the Heritage Council in 2023.

Species Focus



The Narrow-bordered Bee Hawk-moth (*Hemaris tityus*) is a day-flying moth that looks a bit like a bee! It is found on unimproved, damp grassland where it's larval foodplant, Devil's-bit Scabious, grows. Eggs are laid on the underside of scabious leaves, and the larvae develop from July to August, before overwintering as a pupa. Adults fly in May and June and hover as they feed on nectar from flowers such as Bird's-foot-trefoil.

Wild Atlantic Nature Education Programme Launch

On 2nd June, the IPCC was at the launch of the new primary school education programme for Wild Atlantic



Nature LIFE IP. In attendance were Crannóg Buí National School, the Heritage Council and Minister Charlie McConalogue. The programme, which teaches children about blanket bogs, was developed by the IPCC in partnership with the Heritage Council.

Community Engagement and Education Programme





May and June was a busy time for IPCC facilitating peatland educational visits both at the Bog of Allen Nature Centre and through outreach. At Mount Lucas Wind Farm the IPCC presented bogland workshops with primary schools across five days. The IPCC guided students from Gallen Community School to their communities newly opened boardwalk on Ferbane Bog SAC. An information stand

was held in Lanesborough Library as part of their **Environment Week 2023** and the IPCC offered a peatland stand and talk during Newtown Forbe's Festival of Science. The IPCC also attended the Lough Ree Environmental Summer School Festival and facilitated a citizen science workshop and walk to Clara Bog SAC during the Clara Heritage Society Bog Trotters weekend.
