## Conservation Action Plan for Girley Bog



The IPCC is in the process of developing a ten year Conservation Action Management Plan for Girley Bog. The aim of the plan is to protect and enhance the habitats and wildlife present on Girley Bog and to utilise the site responsibly for recreation, education and public awareness. The plan will document the significance of Girley Bog for heritage, recreation and education. It will include a series of actions needed to maintain and enhance its wildlife and recreational importance, as well as documenting fully restoration works undertaken on the site to date. The opinion of the local community on the plan will be sought through public survey and directly at open days on site during heritage week (30th August).

#### Meet Katie Geraghty IPCC's new Campaign Officer



I became a volunteer on the Girley Bog project in the summer of 2014. I had recently finished a degree in Wildlife Biology at the Institute of Technology in Tralee. During my time at Tralee I gained knowledge of the many environmental and conservation issues in Ireland. For my thesis I completed a study of spiders on the Mount Brandon Nature Reserve, Co. Kerry. This is where I developed a love, not only for spiders, but also for Ireland's peatlands. I began to appreciate the beauty of bogs and their importance as wildlife habitats and also for the ecosystem services they provide. In May 2015 I became Campaign Officer for the IPCC, I am delighted to be part of the IPCC's team and look forward to helping conserve and enhance Ireland's bogs.

#### Sustainable peat source needed for mushroom growing



When we buy our mushrooms from the local supermarket, we do not always spare a thought to how these mushrooms are grown. Currently many Irish mushroom growers are using peat extracted from Irish bogs to grow their mushrooms, many of which are exported abroad. In fact Ireland boasts the largest mushroom company in Europe and second largest in the world. The issue is that these mushrooms are grown with a peat casing above the compost, and we are unaware where this

peat is being sourced. The IPCC are seeking to ensure that this peat is being responsibly sourced and not being extracted from bogs of conservation concern. It is notable that the Australian Permaculture Research Institute (www.permaculturenews.org) advises against the growth of button mushrooms and instead pushes focus on the growth of other types, as it is the button mushrooms which require casing and as this requires peat such growth is viewed as unsustainable.

### Award for IPCC's Tadhg Ó Corcora



Tadhg Ó Corcora, Conservation Officer with the Irish Peatland Conservation Council scooped an award for Ireland from the International Peat Society. Tadhg has been working with the IPCC for six years now in the Bog of Allen Nature Centre and is skilled in peatland restoration work.

The awards are given by the International Peat Society under the Allan Robertson Grant Scheme. The award encourages excellence in the field of peatland management. The International Peat Society is a group whose memebrs have environmental and economic interests in peat and peatlands worldwide.

The grant is valued at €500 and can be used by the winner to further their work. " I am delighted to receive this international endorsement for my work and I will be putting the

funds towards a project to undertake Sphagnum moss restoration on Girley Bog in Co. Meath" says Mr Ó Corcora.





The Large Heath butterfly (Coenonympha tullia) is uncommon in Ireland and is Red listed as vulnerable in both Ireland and Europe. Throughout it's life cycle it feeds on two plant species; the larva feed on bog cotton (Eriophorum sp.) and the adult feed on cross leaved heather (Erica tetralix). For this reason the species is restricted to good quality bog habitats. The IPCC is happy to announce the Large Heath has been observed in large numbers on both Lodge Bog and Girley Bog

### **Raised Bogs: Restoration and** Conservation Plans

IPCC is represented on the steering committee of the Raised Bog project of the Peatlands Council. We are happy to report progress on the development of restoration and conservation plans for the 53 raised bog special areas of conservation. We have reviewed documents that set out conservation objectives for each site and we have made comments on the restoration works proposed for the sites based on our own experience in raised bog restoration and management. Plans are underway to hold a workshop on best practice in raised bog restoration measures and from this workshop to develop a much needed handbook on the current best practice.
