Highlights of 2012

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The Irish Peatland Conservation Council's (IPCC) mission is to conserve a representative portion of the peatlands of Ireland for future generations to enjoy. We run the national Save the Bogs Campaign, we own three peatland nature reserves in Kildare and Waterford and we manage the Bog of Allen Nature Centre, which is open to visitors and school groups. We provide an extensive information service on our web site at www.ipcc.ie. IPCC have five members of staff and is supported by 100 volun-

teers. Four thousand individuals subscribe to our campaign.



Peatland Sites

IPCC work nationally to ensure that of sites of conservation importance are protected from unsustainable development. We also work to protect three peatland reserves which are in our ownership. This work is carried out by IPCC's Conservation Officer and a team of reserve volunteers.

Curlew Survey at Lodge Bog, Co. Kildare

A key project for 2012 focused on the Curlew on Lodge Bog. The survey discovered a population of three curlew on Lodge Bog. Breeding was undertaken but the eggs were predated. The suitability of the habitat for Curlew was assessed and recommendations were made to help ensure future successful breeding of this rare bird. IPCC were assisted in this work by scientific staff from University College Dublin in particular David Dwyer and Dr Heather Lally. We are grateful to our supporters who donated to the project and to Kildare County Council and Bord na Móna for financial assistance.

Conservation Staff continued to monitor water levels on Lodge Bog and to set up trials for the restoration of peat forming vegetation using the *Sphagnum* transfer technique developed by Canadian peatland scientists. The visitor boardwalk on the site was covered with wire mesh to prevent slips and falls during damp weather.

Butterfly Project on Lullymore West Bog, Co. Kildare

This site is one of the top butterfly biodiversity sites in Ireland with 21 different species recorded. In 2012 butterfly numbers were down due to poor weather, but IPCC volunteers undertook 26 visits to the site to record the 1km long butterfly transect. A total of 869 butterflies were recorded and 19 different species. Scrub removal from the forest walk area of the transect was undertaken.

In addition Lullymore West Bog is a refuge for the Marsh Fritillary Butterfly. IPCC monitor the population of the butterfly in Spring and Autumn by counting webs of larvae. Nest numbers were down due to bad weather. Eight nests were recorded in spring having over-wintered from 2011 and six nests in autumn.

Fenor Bog, Co. Waterford

Fenor Bog was included as part of a field visit with the Irish Wildlife Trust/Waterford County Council conference on wetlands which was held in Dunhill, Co. Waterford. Catherine O'Connell from IPCC and Rita Byrne from the Móin Fhionnurach Development Association (MFDA) guided participants to the features of the site. Water monitoring of the site was undertaken monthly by the MFDA.

Monitoring Peatlands of Conservation Importance Nationally

During the year IPCC responded to 14 site enquiries

and planning appeals as documented in the table inset.


Sphagnum moss Restoration Workshops

Four workshops demonstrating the technique of Sphagnum moss restoration on raised bogs were organised throughout the year. The first course was held on Lodge Bog and was well attended by peatland managers and consultants. The course was supported by the Environmental Protection Agency under the STRIVE programme. Three further courses were held at Clara Bog, Girley Bog and Shannon Bog during the year. These were supported by the Heritage Council. IPCC's pioneering trials of Sphagnum moss restoration in Ireland work was filmed by Duncan Stewart for broadcast in Spring 2013 in the ECOEYE series.

Girley Bog, Co. Meath Restoration Plan

IPCC in conjuction with James Keegan and Dr Heather Lally from University College Dublin IPCC organised for a Restoration Plan to be drawn up for Girley Bog, Co. Meath.



IPCC continue to work with other stakeholders on the Peatlands Council. The Council is helping to find a solution to the issue of turf cutting on Raised Bog Special Areas of Conservation and is also heavily involved in devising a Peatland Strategy for Ireland. Progress is being made on both fronts. By the year end 1763 farmers had signed up for financial compensation, 747 opted for relocation and 108 deliveries of turf were made. The Council recieved 430 submissions on the National Peatland Strategy. During the year a new chairman was appointed by Minister Jimmy Deenihan. Mr Seamus Boland of Irish Rural Link took up office in November and will guide

the work of the Council going forward.

Policy Development

During the year IPCC made 10 policy submissions to Government and non Governmental bodies as shown in the table inset above.



IPCC are participating on the Environmental Pillar of Social Partnership together with most of the leading non governmental organisations in Ireland. Our representative attended five meetings during the year. We made submissions and voted on the following key

Irish Peat Society (IrPS)/International Peat Society (IPS)

Dr Catherine O'Connell continues in her role as the Chair of the Irish Peat Society, which is the Irish National Committee of the International Peat Society.

Dr O'Connell attended the meeting of the National Committees of the International Peat Society in Stockholm, Sweden in June. This co-incided with the 14th International Peat Society Symposium which had the theme of Peatlands in Balance. Dr O'Connell presented an oral paper entitled Irish Raised Bog Conservation while Mr Tadhg O'Corcora presented a poster paper entitled: The Lodge Bog Management Plan. Both papers were published in the Symposium proceedings. During the symposium field excursions were organised to peatlands in Sweden and this provided the IPCC representatives with the opportunity to see pristine raised bogs in Sweden, to study peatland formation and to see how peatlands are interpreted for visitors.

In October the IrPS held its annual workshop and AGM meeting in Mayo. The theme of the two day event was Managing Western Peatlands. There were study tours of Srahduggan, an area of intact blanket bog within the Ballycroy National Park, the process of rehabilitation of former industrial peatland at Oweninny by Bord na Móna following the completion of peat extraction in 2003 and the establishment of the first wilderness park in Ireland in North Mayo by Coillte and the NPWS. Discussions were held in the field about the development of wind farms on industrial cutaway bogs. The seminar the following day continued with related themes.

IPCC 30 Years - International Bog Day

The Mayor of Kildare - Mr Michael 'Spike' Nolan officially launched the 30th birthday celebrations for IPCC on International Bog Day. A crowd of 200 friends of the bog from all over Ireland gathered to take part in the days events. The Dublin Falconry and Hawking Club displayed and flew a selection of beautiful birds of prey including Barn Owls, European Eagle Owl, Bengal Eagle Owl, Peregrine/Saker Falcon, Saker Falcon and Harris Hawk. Many friends of the bog got the opportunity to feed and handle the birds which was wonderful. There were talks from IPCC staff about the work we do in education,

conservation and research. The pond dipping activity for children was also a highlight of the day. Oliver Carney from Rathangan played the accordion while friends enjoyed picnics in the grounds. The day ended with a walk on Lodge Bog. Below is a selection of photographs taken by guests who joined

Awareness, Education & Training

The Bog of Allen Nature Centre is a portal for IPCC's awareness, education and training programmes. IPCC's strength lies in the variety of educational programmes we offer in house and as part of our national outreach educational programme.

Visitor Attraction Experience

The Bog of Allen Nature Centre was invited to take part in a mentoring programme by Fáilte Ireland with a view to improving the visitor experience of peatlands with IPCC. A 72 hour programme resulted in an action plan being drawn up of short to long term goals to achieve. Staff developed four key messages to impart to visitors and undertook numerous changes to help orientate visitors on arrival and to encourage them to take action for bogs when they go home. We employed an Information Guide - Miss Kate Machamara - to work with visitors at the centre and to ensure they get a unique experience of bogs. Visitor research is being undertaken on an on-going basis which will help to guide future developments at the centre. On our web site we developed special visitor attraction pages and a "what to expect" movie to help quests get the most out of their visit. The bog of Allen Nature Centre has also been included on the Dublin Wicklow driving route which was launched by Fáilte Ireland towards the year end. In addition the nature centre is also included in the Network of Wetland Link International Centres. We undertook construction work developing a new exit to the gardens at the centre from the Nature Shop. This integrates the peat free gardens with the centre and provides for a more logical route for the visitor to take during their stay with us.

Group Visits to the Bog of Allen Nature Centre 41 groups visited the centre during the year involving 1310 visitors.

IPCC's Key Messages for Visitors to the Bog of Allen Nature Centre

- A: The bogs of Ireland are amazingly beautiful and exciting places to visit
- B: For centuries Irish people have developed a deep connection with peatlands
- C: The IPCC take action for Irish peatlands and their wildlife so as to ensure they are safeguarded in the future
- D: Irish bogs are important in a world context because of their unique biodiversity, their carbon and water stores, their heritage and inspiration and for human health and well-being.









Children's Camps

The Nature Fun Summer Camp organised at the Nature Centre was attended by 8 children.

Schools Energy Workshops

IPCC delivered 20 Sustainable Energy Association of Ireland (SEAI) energy workshop days to primary schools as an outreach activity in 2012.

Heritage in Schools

As an outreach activity IPCC undertook 11 Heritage in Schools visits to schools in Kildare, Meath and Dublin. As part of this programme IPCC also delivered a workshop and field study course to trainee teachers in Marino College of Education and the Church of Ireland College of Education in Rathmines, Dublin.

Information Stands

IPCC mounted information stands at the Irish Science Teachers Association AGM in Dublin, the Native Species Weekend in Dublin Zoo, the Harvest Festival in Wolfe Tone Quay, Dublin and the Family fun Day in Kildare County Council.

Lectures

IPCC staff made presentations during the year to visiting research groups from Trinity College, University College, Tralee Institute of Technology and to the Education team from the Lille Vildemose in Denmark.

Stop Food Waste

IPCC continued our work on the Stop Food Waste Initiative of the EPA as a sub-contractor. Further demonstration sites were opened in Mayo, Dublin, Wexford. IPCC manned stands at the Volvo Ocean Race, the Taste of Monaghan and the Feed 5000 in Dublin. Some of this work was filmed by Duncan Stewart for ECOEYE.

Guided Walks

Guided Walks and talks were given in Gaelscoil Carrick-on-Shannon, during Kilrush Biodiversity Week, in liaison with Kildare Development Association, for the Féile Bhríde celebrations in Kildare Town, for Ecotourism in Kerry, with the Biodiversity bus in liaison with Kildare Town Fáilte and Cork Print Makers





Art Project. In addition a number of biodiversity walks were undertaken in liaison with Tidy Towns Groups in North Tipperary.

Open Days - Féile an Dulra

Open Days for the public included a Biodiversity Show in May, Environment Day in June, International Bog Day in July, Heritage Week Open Day in August and Culture Night in September.

Local Agenda Environmental Partnership Fund (LAEPF) Talks

Travelling Exhibition

IPCC's Bogland Exhibition was displayed in Edenderry Library for Heritage Week and in Athy Library for Christmas.

Weather Station

IPCC provided Met Éireann with temperature, humidity and rainfall measurements from our station in Lullymore throughout 2012. Our recording skills were increased during the year to include ground temperatures.

Garden Biodiversity Monitoring

IPCC submitted butterfly, breeding bird data and garden bird data recorded during the year to the National Biodiversity Data Centre, the Dublin Naturalists' Field Club and BirdWatch Ireland.

Hop To It Frog Survey 2012

IPCC received 278 frog records during the year. The database now holds 4372 records for the 32 counties of Ireland.

Communications & Publicity

Two issues of Peatland News were printed and circulated to supporters. One issue of Action for Bogs was published on the IPCC website for visitors to download.

The cessation of turf cutting issue created a lot of media locally and nationally. IPCC was included in a number of articles outlining differences of opinion. We featured a number of times on the RTE Drivetime programme regarding this issue.

IPCC rolled out a series of workshops during the year on the *Sphagnum* moss transfer method of raised bog restoration. These attracted media attention and IPCC were interviewed on RTE's Mooney Goes Wild Programme about this work.

Local Press gave good coverage to IPCC events in particular IPCC's thirty year anniversary.

IPCC's Chief Executive attended a training course on the development of web sites using Wordpress. With additional mentoring from the Communications Officer in the Irish Environmental Network we launched a brand new web site in July. The website is designed to meet the needs of intending visitors to the Bog of Allen Nature Centre and those seeking information about peatlands in Ireland or about the Save the Bogs Campaign.

What's So Special About Peat?

IPCC printed, published and circulated a leaflet on the value of peatlands to Ireland. This was part of an information campaign targeted at stakeholders in Irish peatlands.

Supporters & Volunteers

IPCC retained and recruited new volunteers to the organisation in 2012. Volunteers from our nature reserves team were involved in the *Sphagnum* moss trials, research projects on Lodge Bog and in the butterfly surveys on Lullymore West Bog. In addition volunteers continue to play a vital role in IPCC's collec-

tors appeal which saw them sorting through over 100 kg of used stamps during the year.
